

The antagonists return with a stark request: "Teacher, we want to see a sign from you" (Fair enough?)

- Jesus had just healed and delivered a blind, mute man (16 verses ago)
- Before that He healed the man with the **shriveled** hand (12:13)
- Before that He healed two **blind** men at the same time (9:30)
- Before that He raised a girl form the dead (9:25)
- Before that He healed a paralyzed man (9:6)
- Before that He calmed the **storm** (8:26)
- Before that He cleansed a leper (8:3)
 - o That is just in the last 4 chapters!
 - And these religious leaders were present for 4/7 (the rest they heard about)

That is why when they come and ask Jesus for a sign He responds by calling them wicked and adulterous (v. 39)

- Wicked because they were refusing to acknowledge who He was (in spite of clear evidence)
- Adulterous because they refused to be faithful to God (should have known better)

The point is not that it is wrong in general to seek confirmation or proof when someone claims to be from God

• Their own Scriptures (the OT) warned against false prophets and gave criteria for testing a prophet's validity¹

Rather the situation was that they had **already seen and heard** of Jesus' demonstrations **and yet refused** to acknowledge Him as the Messiah

 This was just plainly indicative of the fact that they <u>did not want to</u> get on board with what God was clearly doing (= wicked and adulterous)

The issue: The Pharisees has seen so much and **believed/trusted** so little

They should have known better (they had context... Messianic expectations)

As opposed to Nineveh and the Queen of the South (Sheba) (vv 41-42)

- The Ninevites repented at Jonah's preaching and turned to God (Jonah 3:6-9, NIV)
- The Queen of Sheba glorified God when she witnessed the wisdom of Solomon (1 Kings: 10:9, NIV)
 - o "Something greater than Jonah is here" + "Something greater than Solomon is here"
 - o They had no excuse for not believing!
 - Therefore, Nineveh and the Queen were witnesses of Judgment against the Pharisees

There is a warning here for us

- We who follow Jesus have seen and heard so much
- Admittedly, it may not look like this (though some)
- And still, if we have experienced the forgiveness of sins, then we have become direct participants in the greatest miracle—the Cross
- Romans 8:32, NIV
 - o If we ever doubt that God loves us and is good... Look at the Cross!
 - o Romans 8:33-35 and 37-39, NIV

Why do we then, often doubt/not trust God?

- His Word
- His determination of right from wrong
- His values on things like generosity, sexuality, forgiveness, sacrifice
- His sovereignty
- His care for us
- His plan for us
- What He withholds from us
- His presence in storms
- Romans 8:28

It is not only that we are participants in the greatest miracle—but we are also recipients of the greatest testimony (The Scriptures)

- o There we see the faithfulness of God
- o There we see the love of God
- o There we see the power of God

- There we see the plan of God
- We see God's track record
- o = we have no excuse!

And more than by miracles, our faith is actually built up by the Word

- John 20:27-29, NASB
- Romans 10:17, NASB
- Hebrews 4:12, NLT
- 1 Peter 1:23-2:3, NASB
- Hebrews 2:1, NASB
- Hebrews 3:7-15, NASB

The Pharisees should have known better—in what ways and places and spaces should we "know better"?

Jesus gives an analogy here that was meant to wake the Pharisees up to their own falsehood and lack of faith

- **Verses 43-45**
- The point is not about demons... they are just the analogy
- The point is about the life that refuses to actually go God's way—when having enough evidence of God's grace and goodness
 - Verse 43 = An impure spirit leaving a person (Cf. Evidence of God's grace and goodness)
 - Verse 44 = House that is unoccupied, swept clean and put in order (The evidence of a life that has not fully embraced God)
 - Religious (swept clean and put in order) but not fully given to God (unoccupied)
 - Cf. Whitewashed tombs (playing games with God)
 - 2 Timothy 3:1-5, NLT
 - Result = verse 45
 - 2 Peter 2:19-22, NASB
 - The point = if we have experienced God's grace and goodness, we must respond in true faith

What does that response look like? The next story is positioned perfectly to illustrate that

Verses 46-50

Not so much a rejection of his natural family² (half brothers... Cf. John 7:5) as it was a clarification of the true family of God

- The family of faith—spiritual family
- "Whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my true family"
 - Not works based: John 6:35-40, NASB
 - o There is a family code: Matthew 6:9-10, NASB
 - o There is the doing of God's will: Ephesians 2:4-10, NIV
 - o There is always a battle of the wills: "Thy will be done"

Jesus did say that there would be one defining sign... (verse 40)

- His resurrection from the dead!
- "Jesus was declared the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead!" (Romans 1:4)
- Romans 6:4-12, NLT

When is enough enough? When do our excuses come to an end?
