Revelation 3:14-20 | The Lukewarm Church

Laodicea (Jesus had no commendation for them)

- MAP (keep up until I move on from the list below)
 - Ephesus = love for Jesus (not just busywork)
 - Smyrna = willingness to suffer for Jesus (no compromise)
 - Pergamum = discerning doctrine (truth in face of error)
 - o Thyatira = holiness in the church (righteousness in midst of evil)
 - Sardis = inward reality (not outward show)
 - Philadelphia = evangelistic opportunities
 - o Laodicea = need for wholehearted commitment
- = A holistic picture of the church

Laodicea = Big banks, beautiful black clothes, medical advances—bad water

Verses 15-16

- Neither hot or cold
 - o This is an often misunderstood passage
 - o The mineral rich hot-springs in Heirapolis
 - o The cold spring-waters in Colossae
 - By the time they got to Laodicea they were lukewarm
 - Not useful. Not healing (hot) or refreshing (cold)
 - I will spit you out... (No one enjoys lukewarm drinks—e.g. milk and coffee)
 - What does that mean? (Imagery)
- What does it mean to be hot or cold?
 - = Not lukewarm! (Complacent, passive, idle, shallow, self-satisfied, superficially settled)

They were:

- Wealthy and self-sufficient; well dressed and successful fashinistas and physicians
 - They took pride in all these things

Verses 17-18

- Jesus is using common points of reference to teach them spiritual truths
 - = wretched and miserable and poor and blind and naked (v. 17)
- They were unaware of their true condition before God (bec. of self-sufficiency and affluence)
 - o The wealth of their culture did not (could not) meet their deepest needs
 - o Their needs were **deeper** than their resources could handle
 - o They were not physical or economic but **spiritual**
 - o Their abundant physical and economic resources had **dulled** their need for Jesus
 - $_{\circ}$ = wretched and miserable and poor and blind and naked (v. 17)
 - You can have everything and yet have nothing (be rich, but actually poor)
 - Wealthiest nation = most depressed (most psychologists and psychotherapists in world)
 - If money makes you happy—why are Americans so unhappy?
 - More is not what we need—Jesus is what we need

Jesus is calling them to recognize the deep need they have and so cease to be lukewarm

- Ladvise you to buy from me (Emphasis not on 'buy' but on 'from Me'; not commerce but communion)
 - o Gold refined by fire (Jesus alone can **enrich** us with abundant life in Him)
 - o White garments (Jesus alone can **cover** our sin and shame)
 - o Eyesalve (Jesus alone can **open** our eyes to see things as they really are)

This is the advice/counsel of Jesus

- There is other counsel you are receiving, that is contrary (world; flesh; devil)
 - Verse 14 = But Jesus is the 'amen' (truth + certainty; firm + fixed + unflinching) and the 'faithful and true witness' (tells the truth) and the 'source of all things' (knows ultimate truth)
 - o AND... He is the One who loves you!

Verse 19

- Because He loves us (He tells us the truth and calls us out)
 - o If we miss His motive of love we miss everything
 - And we will never respond rightly

We must continually remind ourselves of the GOSPEL and its truths (horrifically bad; wonderfully loved)

- Our ongoing need for Christ
- If we are **not** reminded of our <u>constant ongoing need for the gospel</u>—if we do not **feel** that <u>JESUS IS OUR</u> GREATEST NEED...
 - o ... other "needs" will begin to seem more urgent and immediate, more significant and relevant
- If we do not **carefully** and **consciously oppose** the growing significance of these "felt needs"—WHICH ARE REALLY FASLE NEEDS—we will find that the world and its agenda is what is most relevant to us
- God and the gospel and the kingdom become irrelevant (lukewarm—spewed out)

Questions from commentary¹

- Read directly from book (pg. 124)
- These questions are trying to get at four significant key questions:
 - o 1. What shapes your thinking (the world or the Bible)?
 - 2. What communication do you view as most important (horizontal with other people or vertical with God)?
 - 3. What do you trust (money or Jesus)?
 - o 4. With what do you ultimately identify (a political party or the Kingdom of God)?
- 2 Steps to overcoming complacency (verse 19)
 - Repent = aorist tense (once and irrevocably)
 - Be zealous = present tense (to continue always)

Fires have to be stoked and Cool waters have to be kept -- intentionality

• Proverbs 4:23

Watch over your heart with all diligence, for from it flow the springs of life. (BLACKBOARD?)

How do we stay in a place of being zealous for the Lord?

• Keep the door continually open to Him who loves us! INTIMACY

Verse 20

- Deipnon = this was the evening meal; the main meal of the day; people lingered over it
 - o What keeps you from lingering with Jesus?
 - o What keeps Him locked outside your heart?
 - What forces its way in? (Roman soldiers in Laodicea)
 - Where and how do you allow Jesus to linger with you?
 - Daily devotions; Intentional times and prayer; Second Set; Communion offers this

If we allow Christ to sit at our table He will allow us to sit with Him on His throne (verse 21)
